Dr Rachel van Besouw Faculty of Engineering and the Environment (ISVR) Dr Rachel van Besouw is a RCUK Academic Fellow in the Institute of Sound and Vibration Research. She has been awarded an Arts & Humanities Research Council grant with Prof. David Nicholls for a collaborative research project on developing music (re) habilitation materials and compositions with and for severely or profoundly deaf people who use a cochlear implant.



Faculty of Physical and Applied Sciences (ECS)

Professor Bullock is Director of Southampton's new Institute for Complex Systems Simulation (ICSS), co-director of the University Strategic Research Group in Complexity in Real World Contexts (USRG Complexity). He helped found the Science and Engineering of Natural Systems (SENSe) research group and Agents, Interaction and Complexity (AIC) research group.

Dr Graeme Earl, a Senior Lecturer in Archaeology, is a member of the University Strategic Research Groups (USRG) for the Digital Economy and Maritime Studies. Via the Computational Modelling Group he is also involved in the activities of the USRG in Complexity Science. His research is currently funded by grants from the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC), British Academy, Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation, Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council (EPSRC) and JISC.



Prof. Jane Falkingham Faculty of Social and Human Sciences (Social Sciences) Professor Falkingham is Director of the ESRC Centre for Population Change, Head of the Academic Unit of Social Sciences and Professor of Demography and International Social Policy. Her research interests include; population ageing and social security, the redistributive effect of the welfare state, the impact of economic transition on living standards within the countries of the former Soviet Union and the relationship between poverty and health in low income settings.



Prof. Douglas Macbeth Faculty of Business and Law (Management)

Professor Macbeth is Director of Business Development, Professor of Purchasing and Supply Chain Management and the Director of Supply Chain Research at Southampton. He is also the founding Director of SCMG Ltd, a Supply Chain Management, Procurement and Logistics consultancy.



Prof. Peter Middleton Faculty of Humanities (English)

Professor Middleton is a Director of the Centre for Cultural Poetics and was recently awarded an Arts and Humanities Research Board grant to help develop the British Electronic Poetry Centre. He is an author of a study of theories and texts on masculinity and is currently writing a book on American Science and Poetry in the Cold War. In the future he hopes to collaborate with researchers on fictional predictions of global catastrophe.



Prof. Philip Nelson Professor Philip Nelson is currently responsible for the development of University-wide research strategy. He is also a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering, the Institution of Mechanical Engineers, the Institute of Acoustics and a Fellow of the Acoustical Society of America. He is a member of the boards of the University of Southampton Science Park Ltd., University of Southampton Holdings Ltd., Southampton Asset Management Ltd., and the Wyvern Seedcorn Fund. He also serves on the CBI South East Regional Council, and the boards of Hampshire Economic Partnership and of the 'SETsquared' partnership of Southampton, Bristol, Bath and Surrey Universities.

Dr Richard Polfreman Faculty of Humanities (Music)

Dr Polfreman, a lecturer in music, has collaborated with IRCAM (Paris) and INA-GRM (Paris) and Sound Intermedia (London) on a number of projects involving the design of innovative music software and use of music technology in live performance and installations. He was awarded an i10 Enterprise Fellowship in 2004 and has recently completed an Arts and Humanities Research Board-funded project exploring the issues of preservation of works involving live electronics.



Prof. Ajit Shenoi Faculty of Engineering and the Environment (Ship Science) Professor Ajit Shenoi is Lloyds Register/Royal Academy of Engineering Research Professor of Lightweight Structures and was head of the Fluid Structure Interactions Research Group at the University of Southampton. He is also the founding Director of the Southampton Marine and Maritime Institute.



Prof. Mikis Tsimplis

Faculty of Business and Law (Law)

Professor Tsimplis is jointly appointed by the School of Law and the National Oceanography Centre. His scientific research is on sea level rise while his legal research is on environmental and maritime law. He is currently participating in an EU funded project looking at the liability for carbon storage under the seabed and a scientific project examining marine extremes under climate changes scenarios funded by Lloyd's Register Trust Fund. He is on the Governing board of the Institute of Maritime Law and on the steering committee of the Medclivar initiative
